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How your gift brings joy to children who are deafblind

Your legacy will mean that Sense can be there for a child who is deafblind every step of the way Receiving the news that their baby is deafblind can be overwhelming for parents. They may struggle to comprehend how their child might learn and develop, or even if they will ever be able to connect with their child.

That's why Sense and your legacy are so important. Sense specialise in helping children who are deafblind or have complex disabilities to fulfil their potential. No other organisation offers the same level of knowledge and experience.

Our early intervention enables us to discover and build on the smallest area of sight or hearing that a child may have, along with learning to engage all their other senses through specialist play. It can take weeks, months or years of work for those precious breakthroughs to come, but when a little boy or girl shows their happiness or excitement for the first time, when they know and respond to their parent with a first sign or word – it's a precious moment of joy, with many more to follow.

It's these moments of joy that you will be including in your Will if you decide to leave a legacy to Sense.

You can include the **joy** of being in water...

Mia has complex disabilities, and she can't go to her local swimming pool because the normal water temperature would cause her muscles to tense up.

But at Sense Family Centres, everything from the warm hydrotherapy pool to the play areas are designed to include children like Mia. As she slides into the pool with dad Andy, Mia feels safe and comfortable, and gives a beautiful smile.

You can ensure that children like Mia aren't left out.

...the joy of going on a big adventure..

You can help children experience the joy of a Sense Holiday.

So many activities children enjoy aren't accessible or safe for children who are deafblind like Dylan without specialist support.

On a Sense Holiday, Dylan gets to try so many exciting experiences he would otherwise miss out on, like meeting animals at the zoo or feeling the thrill of the climbing wall. Throughout the week, his confidence grows as he learns and explores a new environment.

...the joy of moving to the rhythm...

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Luca has CHARGE syndrome that affects his ability to see, hear and balance. To tap into a world of sound, Luca needs Sense's specialist support.

With help from his Sense Family Support Worker, Luca can feel all kinds of different sounds and music through the vibrations of a resonance board. And Sense's support also means he is learning to sign along to his favourite songs, like Twinkle Twinkle Little Star.

You can help a child who is deafblind get specialist support.

...and the **Joy** of saying "Daddy"

You can help a child who is deafblind communicate for the first time.

Ernie has Down's Syndrome and very little hearing, so Sense is helping him find his own way to communicate.

We've been teaching Ernie exercises to help with his speech, and it was such a heart-warming moment when he said his first word – "Daddy". He's also become a confident signer along with his twin brother Ted, and is teaching his grandparents how to sign too.

Your Will sets out your wishes

You can take care of those you love

Writing a Will is the best way of ensuring your family and friends are looked after. It is also a reflection of the person you are and the things you care about.

You'll know that your wishes have been recognised

People often put off making a Will for another day. But once it's completed, you can be sure that the family, friends and causes that bring you joy will be taken care of.

You can get your Will written for free

You could save tax

When you leave a gift to a charity like Sense in your Will, you often get some tax benefits. A specialist can give you more advice on this.

You can make a world where children who are deafblind are included

No gift is too small to include

When you leave a gift to Sense in your Will, it's not the amount that counts. It's knowing that we have your support in years to come. Even a 1% share of your estate can help to give specialist support to families, bringing smiles, laughter and joy to more children who are deafblind or have complex disabilities like Tyrese.

Giving joy with a gift in your Will

Any gift that you leave to Sense will make a difference.

A residuary gift is the remainder, or a percentage of the remainder of your estate, once other payments have been made, and is the choice of many of our supporters.

We suggest this wording:

'I give _____ % of my residuary estate to Sense, 101 Pentonville Road, London N1 9LG Registered charity number 289868, to be applied for its general purposes and I declare that the receipt of the finance director or appropriate officer shall be a complete discharge to my trustees.'

Or you may decide to give a fixed sum of money – a pecuniary gift – using this wording:

'I give \pm to Sense, 101 Pentonville Road, London N1 9LG Registered charity number 289868, to be applied for its general purposes and I declare that the receipt of the finance director or appropriate officer shall be a complete discharge to my trustees.'

No matter what you decide, children who are deafblind will be understood, learn new skills and feel the love of their families in years to come.

And all this joy will be because of you.
